VICKERS F.B. 5

The first "pusher" to enter service during World War I was the Vickers Fighting Biplane 5. A two-seater, it was the first aircraft specifically designed as a fighter for the Royal Flying Corps. The first F.B.5 to reach France was delivered to 2 Squadron in February 1915 and 11 Squadron was equipped with F.B.5s in July 1915. Also known as the Vickers "Gunbus," it was armed with a moveable. forward-firing machine gun but it was vulnerable to attack from the rear. The F.B.5 was soon replaced by more advanced singleseat fighter aircraft like the Airco D.H.2. No original F.B.5 aircraft survive

VICKERS PILOT MAJOR FREDERICK J. POWELL, (1895-1992) Posted to 5 Squadron, he scored two victories flying the Vickers F.B.5 and four victories flying the F.E.8. After serving with 40 Squadron, Powell assumed command of 41 Squadron on 2 August 1917. He was awarded the Military Cross a week later. Shot down over Auberchicourt by Jasta 10 and captured.





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
